36		does not allow these restrictions. He believes all the trail access points should be	
37	accessible for not only hikers but horseback riders, mountain bikers and other activities. He also		
38	brought up that he was concerned about emergency vehicle access.

40	Chairman Cote assured Mr. Pickard that the Board of Selectmen did not vote to represent one		
41	side over the other, they voted based off the Town's majority vote of the warrant article.		
42	Chairman Cote urged everyone in Town to come vote in March, as this is the time where you can

# Public Hearing: Captain Toom, Pelham PD – Acceptance of funds from PD Highway Safety Grant 24-146 in the amount of \$17,096.25. The funds provided are to be used by the Pelham Police Department for seven (7) in-car radar units and one (1) Lidar unit

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62 63 Captain Toom and Chief Perriello approached the Board. Captain Toom explained that he applied for this grant through the New Hampshire Office of Highway Safety because the radar systems in the police cars over fifteen years old. Captain Toom explained that the grant covers 75% of the costs, so the Town would be paying around \$5,000 for eight new radar systems and the grant would pay for the other \$17,096.25. Captain Toom believes this grant is a great opportunity.

66 Chairman Cote opened the discussion up to the public. No one came forward. Chairman Cote 67 closed the discussion to the public.

Chairman Cote asked if the 25% the grant does not cover is coming out of the Police Department
budget. Captain Toom stated that it was, and after they purchase the new systems they will be
reimbursed from the grant for 75% of the cost. They need permission from the Board to take

72 \$5,000.00 out of their budget for 25% of the cost that the grant does not cover.

Ms. Takesian asked if they also needed to make a motion to accept the funds. Chairman Cotestated they do.

### 85 Final vote on 2024 Default Operating Budget

86

87 Tammy Penny, Town Finance Director, stated that the Board of Selectmen certifies the default

budget each year and the Budget Committee certifies the proposed operating budget. Ms. Penny

89 explained that the default budget is the amount of the same appropriations that is contained in the

90 operating budget authorized for the previous year, reduced or increased as in the case may be by

91 debt service, contracts and other obligations previously incurred or mandated by law. Also,

92 reduced by one-time expenditures contained in the operating budget and by salaries and benefits

budget is \$21,523,493.00. Ms. Penny had to remove one-time appropriations from the 2023
budget including \$64,000.00 for a new phone system, \$16,000.00 for Civic Gov software and

- 97 \$34,500.00 for building expenses, \$10,000.00 fee for the animal shelter, \$128,500.00 for a
- bridge repair and \$83,000.00 for a solid waste compacter for the Transfer Station. Ms. Penny
  stated that she also had to increase for CBA obligations and adjust accordingly for long-term
- debt. Adjustments were also made to the insurance line as required by CBA or law.

# 107 Final warrant article review/vote

109 Chairman Cote stated that some of these warrant articles they have already acted on, but he will 110 read the articles as they will be posted. The order he is reading them is not necessarily the same 111 order they will be listed.

112

The first warrant article is Congestion Mitagation Air Quality Re-Appropriation for Mammoth 113 Rd Roundabout. Chairman Cote stated that the language will read as "Shall the Town vote to 114 raise and appropriate the sum of three-million four hundred sixty thousand dollars (\$3,460,000) 115 to construct two roundabouts at the intersections of Sherburne Road and Mammoth Road and 116 Mammoth Road and Marsh Road. Said appropriation will be offset by a Congestion Mitigation 117 Air Quality Program (CMAQ) Grant in the amount of two million-six hundred eighty thousand 118 dollars (\$2,680,000) and to be partially offset with exaction fees on deposit of one-hundred and 119 ten-thousand (\$110,000) dollars and to authorize the Selectmen to expend not more than six-120 hundred and seventy thousand dollars \$670,000) from the Unassigned Fund Balance to offset the 121 remaining cost of the project. No money to be raised by taxation. This special article will be a 122 non-lapsing appropriation per RSA 32:7, IV. (Recommended by the Board of Selectmen 5-0-0) 123 (Recommended by the Budget Committee 10-0-0)" 124 125

Chairman Cote noted that this warrant article was already voted on as a Town, but it is a six-year
time frame and the project is taking longer than expected, so they need to vote to extend the
article.

130 The next warrant article is Highway Block Grant Aid, 2024 Special Warrant Article. Chairman

131 Cote stated that the language will read as "Shall the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum

132 of Three Hundred Forty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$345,000) for repair, maintenance, purchase of

equipment and upgrading of Town roads, to be offset by anticipated Highway Block Grant funds.

134 This special article will be a non-lapsing appropriation per RSA 32:7, IV. No money to be raised

by taxation (Recommended by the Selectmen 5-0-0) (Recommended by the Budget Committee

- 136 10-0-0)".
- 137

138 Chairman Cote noted that this was voted on back in October and is free money from the State to 139 use for the roads and other things.

140

141 The next warrant article is Support Union Collective Bargaining Agreement, 2024 Special Warrant Article. Chairman Cote stated that the language will read as "Shall the Town vote to 142 approve cost items included in the five (5) year collective bargaining agreement ratified by the 143 Board of Selectmen and the Pelham Public Works and Municipal Employees, Local 1801 of the 144 American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees (AFSCME), which calls for the 145 following increases in salary and benefits and to further raise and appropriate the sum of One 146 Hundred Forty-Two Thousand, Seven Hundred and Thirteen Dollars (\$142,713) to fund this year 147 of the agreement, such sum representing the additional costs attributable to the increase in 148 salaries and benefits required by the new agreement over those that would be paid at current 149 staffing levels? (Recommended by the Selectmen 5-0-0) (Recommended by the Budget 150 Committee 10-0-0)". 151 152

153 Chairman Cote noted that the 2024 cost will be \$142,713.00, the 2025 cost will be \$122,644.00,

the 2026 cost will be \$98,605, the 2027 cost will be \$90,784.00, and the 2028 cost will be

155 \$100,114.00. This includes three months of 2029. The total accumulated cost is \$554,860.00.

156 This is the contract that the Board of Selectmen and Municipal Support Workers Union agreed

on and are now submitting for the Town to vote on. He noted that a lot of work went into thiscontact, and he believes it is a good deal. Town Administrator Roark noted that the Budget

- 159 Committee recommended it as well.
- 160

The next warrant article is Town 2024 Operating Budget Article - Needs to be voted on now 161 after Budcom's January 11, 2024 Reconsideration meeting. Chairman Cote stated that the 162 language will read as "Shall the Town vote to raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not 163 including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, 164 the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant or as amended by vote of the first 165 session, for the purposes set forth herein totaling Twenty-One Million, Six-Hundred Eighty-One 166 Thousand, Nine-Hundred and Ninety-Seven Dollars (\$21,681,997)? Should this article be 167 defeated, the default budget shall be Twenty-One Million, Five-Hundred Twenty-Three 168 Thousand, Four-Hundred and Ninety-Three Dollars (\$21,523,493)? which is the same as last 169 170 year with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town or by law; or the governing body may hold one special meeting in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to 171 take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. (Recommended by the Budget Committee 172 9-0-0).".

173 174

175 Chairman Cote explained that this is the budget that the Budget Committee has submitted for the176 Board of Selectmen to vote on then for the Town to vote on.

177

178 Ms. Penny stated that the Board of Selectmen deferred some requested items and used grant

money for other requested items, reducing the budget request by \$647,000.00. Then, through

actions of the Budget Committee, the reduction on top of that was approximately \$321,000.00.

181 The impact on an average home for this municipal portion of the tax rate, based on estimates,

- 182 would be .69% or \$18.71 for a \$500,000.00 home.

Department uses. They hold a public sealed bid process. Highway Agent Hoffman then
recommends which bids he would choose, usually the cheapest option, but other things are taken

- into consideration. His recommendation for aggregates is Brocks Industries. His
- 297 recommendation for signs and related items is American Flag Company, Mr. Hoffman noted that
- there is a cheaper company, but they only do bulk orders and take a long time to be delivered. He
- added that American Flag Company is right in Hudson, NH and they can order the quantity that
   is actually needed. Mr. Hoffman's recommendation for line painting is K5 Corporation. His
- recommendation for sand is Brox Industries. His recommendation for culvert pipe is E.J Prescott.
- 302 Mr. Hoffman's recommendation for hot top and cold patch is Brox Industries. His
- recommendation for plow blades is United Rotary Brush. Mr. Hoffman noted that there is a
- cheaper company, but they have a minimum order of \$6,000.00 which is far more than the Town
- ever orders. His recommendation for sweeping is Continental Paving. His recommendation for
- tree removal is Bradley Tree. Town Administrator Roark stated that if any resident would like to review the bids they are available at the Board of Selectmen's office and the Highway
- 307 review the bi308 Department.

- Chairman Cote asked if the Board had anything to discuss on this matter. Town AdministratorRoark assured the Board that all of the bids seem reasonable. The Board had a consensus to go
