Chairman Croteau asked who would like to be the BOS representative for the Pelham 97 Community Coalition. Ms. Takesian stated that this coalition has recently become reactivated, 98 99 and they have a few projects in mind. Ms. Takesian offered to be the representative since she is already involved with them. Mr. Bergeron asked what this coalition does. Ms. Takesian 100 explained that they help to bring awareness of drug misuse in Pelham. The Board agreed to let 101 Ms. Takeisan be the BOS representative. 102 103 Chairman Croteau asked who would like to be the BOS representative for the Planning Board. 104 Ms. Takesian and Mr. Bergeron offered to stay on again this year. The Board agreed. 105 106 Chairman Croteau offered to take over as the BOS representative for the School Board. Ms. 107 108 Corbett and the rest of the Board agreed. 109 Chairman Croteau asked who would like to be the BOS representative for the Salem Chamber of 110 Commerce, now known as Souther New Hampshire Chamber of Commerce. Ms. Abare offered 111 to take this over. The Board agreed. 112 113 Chairman Croteau asked who would like to be the BOS representative for the Water 114 115 Commission. Ms. Abare offered to take this over, since she is involved with the Water Commission. The Board agreed. 116 117 Mr. Bergeron stated he is on the Well Ordinance Sub-committee as well. 118 119 120 Discussion on request from Pennichuck Water Works to assume control of the private fire 121 hydrant at the end of Beaver Brook Way; at a yearly town funded expense. 122 123 Chairman Croteau asked Town Administrator Roark if they were okay to move forward with this 124 discussion, even though it was scheduled for 7:00 pm and it is only 6:40 pm. Town 125 Administrator Roark stated that it was fine since it is not a scheduled public hearing. 126 127 128 Town Administrator Roark stated that this is about a fire hydrant directly across from St. Patrick's Church that goes down into Beaver Brook Way, which has senior housing in the back. 129 Town Administrator Roark read the email from Pennichuck. The email from Pennichuck asked 130 the Town of Pelham to authorize Pennichuck Water Works to "take over" the private hydrant 131 132 located at the entrance to the Beaver Brook Senior Community at the end of Beaver Brook Way. The hydrant charges will be removed from the Beaver Brook Senior Community and transferred 133 to the Town of Pelham under the public water hydrant charges. Presently, public hydrant charges 134 are \$19.65 a month, and the inch foot charge for the 8-inch water main is approximately \$408.00 135 per year. Town Administrator Roark explained that if Pennichuck takes over this hydrant it 136 would become part of Pelham's hydrants and they would have access to it for the other 137 businesses and residential properties near there. He thinks it is a public safety matter, as if they 138 139 do not take over the hydrant the Beaver Brook Senior Community could decide to remove it or take it out of service, making it not usable to the Town in case of a fire in that area. 140 141 Ms. Takesian asked how long this hydrant has been there. Town Administrator Roark stated that 142 143 it has been there since Pennichuck connected Beaver Brook Way to public water, which was a long time ago. Chairman Croteau asked Ms. Abare if she knew when the building was built. Ms. 144

Abare stated that she was unsure, but she is in favor of this because Pennichuck does a good job 145 of going around and checking the hydrants frequently. Ms. Takesian asked how the hydrant got 146 there. Chairman Croteau stated that the owner of Beaver Brook Senior Community had the water 147 line and hydrant installed. Until recently, this was a private water line and hydrant. The building 148 and house that are going up next door to this community needed water to supply the units, and 149 Pennichuck realized they do not own this line and could not access it. The Fire Department 150 would also not be able to access the line. Pennichuck has now made it a public water way. 151 152 Mr. Bergeron asked if they knew if all the abutters were in favor of this. Chairman Croteau 153 stated they were. 154 155 156 **MOTION:** (Abare/Corbett) To assume control of the private fire hydrant at the end of Beaver Brook Way; at a yearly town funded expense. 157 158 **VOTE:** (5-0-0) The motion carried. 159 160 Town Administrator Roark clarified that the Town already has existing fire hydrants that they 161 pay for, this will not be the only one. 162 163 Ms. Abare stated that Pennichuck has a map of all the hydrants in Town and when the last time 164 they checked them was. She explained that with private hydrants, you do not know when the last 165 time they were tested was or if they work. 166 167 Chairman Croteau stated that they have a 7:15 pm appointment scheduled for interviewing 168 candidates, but they are 30 minutes ahead of schedule. Mr. Bergeron stated that some of the 169 candidates are already present. The Board decided to move ahead with the interviews. 170 171 172 Interviews/Appointments: Agricultural Commission, Community Power Committee, 173 **Conservation Commission, Forestry Committee, Zoning Board of Adjustment and Trustee** 174 of the Trust Funds (alternate) candidates 175 176 Danielle Masse-Quinn – Agricultural Commission (3- year term) 177 178 Ms. Masse-Quinn (9 Meadow Lane) stated that she was re-applying for the 3-year term on the 179 180 Agricultural Commission. She stated that she currently sits on this commission as the vice chair and would like to keep her seat. She stated that they are currently working on a community 181 garden, a chestnut tree program, and a compost project. Chairman Croteau asked Ms. Masse-182 Quinn to go over the interview questions as well. Ms. Masse-Quinn stated that she would bring 183 lots of experience to this position, as she has been on the commission for years, owns livestock 184 and a hobby farm, and is knowledgeable of agricultural laws, and takes classes on them. Ms. 185 Masse-Quinn stated that she would like to keep creating agricultural opportunities and programs 186 187 for the community. 188 189 Ms. Abare thanked Ms. Masse-Quinn for volunteering and asked her about her plan to get the community garden project completed this year. Ms. Masse-Quinn stated that this is a work in 190 191 progress, and the commission has looked at over 7 different locations and soil types, their goal is

to pick a location soon. Ms. Abare asked Ms. Masse-Quinn about the compost project since it

- 193 has been implemented. Ms. Masse-Quinn stated that it is going well, they have a small program
- 194 going on with the Transfer Station, and they are hoping to involve the schools and bring the 195 project to a bigger scale.

MOTION: (Abare/Takesian) To appoint Ms. Masse-Quinn to a 3-year term on the
 Agricultural Commission, ending in 2027.

199 200 **VOTE:** (5-0-0) The motion carried.

202 Ms. Masse-Quinn wanted to let the Board know that the Planning Board dissolved the Master
203 Plan Sub-committee the previous night. Chairman Croteau thanked Ms. Masse-Quinn.

206 James Fisher – Agricultural Commission (1-year term)

207

208 Mr. Fisher (47 Seavey Road) stated that he has been an alternate member of the Agricultural
209 Commission for one year now and has enjoyed it very much. He thinks they are a great team and
210 has learned a lot. He would like to get the chestnut trees back into the woods and help out with

- 211 the community garden as well.
- 212

Chairman Croteau asked Mr. Fisher what experience he would bring to the position. Mr. Fisher
stated that he has his farm at home with over 165 fruit trees, blueberry bushes, and other

- produce. He has grown up working on a farm and can bring a lot of knowledge and experience to
- the commission, especially for the community garden. Chairman Croteau asked Mr. Fisher why
- he was seeking this appointment. Mr. Fisher stated that he enjoys working on the commission
- with the team and being a part of the Town. Chairman Croteau asked Mr. Fisher if he had any
- specific goals for the commission. Mr. Fisher explained that he would like to get the AmericanChestnut Tree project going.
- 221

Ms. Abare thanked Mr. Fisher for applying and asked him to share a significant challenge he had faced while owning a small farm. Mr. Fisher stated that he faces many challenges owning a small farm, such as insects, animals, the weather, and more. He stated it is a lot of work and every year is different, but he enjoys it.

Mr. Bergeron asked Mr. Fisher if he was applying to be a full-time member or an alternate. Mr.
Fisher clarified that he is currently an alternate but would like to be a full-time member for 1
year.

Chairman Croteau stated that Mr. Fisher would be filling a 1-year term since someone has
 resigned. Chairman Croteau read the letter of resignation received by Laura Spottiswood into the

- record. He stated that Mr. Fisher's term would end in 2025.
- 235 MOTION: (Bergeron/Takesian) To appoint Mr. Fisher to a 1-year term on the Agricultural
 236 Commission, ending in 2025.

- 241 Paul Gagnon Conservation Commission (3-year term)
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Chairman Croteau stated that Mr. Gagnon (103 Dutton Road) is currently out of the country but
is applying for a 3-year term on the Conservation Commission. Chairman Croteau stated that he
is confident the Board knows Mr. Gagnon and is aware of everything he has done for the Town.
Chairman Croteau stated he is comfortable appointing Mr. Gagnon to a 3-year term on the
Conservation Commission.

255 Al Steward – Conservation Commission (3-year term)

256

Mr. Steward (6 Vista Drive) stated that he has been on the Conservation Commission and 257 258 Forestry Committee for over 5 years now and has been searching for open spaces. He has been 259 an alternate member and is currently the chair of the Conservation Commission. Before this, he worked in manufacturing for 30 years. He stated that he would like to continue the processes and 260 261 successes they have had in the past couple of years in developing open spaces, documenting natural resources, completing the conservation plan for Pelham, and creating relationships in 262 263 Town. Mr. Steward referenced RSA 36:A which states the definition of conservation. Mr. 264 Steward stated that he asked the Commission to outline 5 items they considered significant in conservation for the coming year. His list was to review the master plan, create bylaws, continue 265 searching for open space, continue to have a display at Old Home Day, and research and 266 establish prime wetlands. Mr. Steward stated he would also like to ensure that they expand their 267 ability to have citizens utilize public bodies of water and is hoping to go forward with his idea of 268 creating a usable space for residents by Beaver Brook. 269 270 Ms. Abare thanked Mr. Steward for volunteering and his work in open space and asked him to 271 speak about his passion for open space and finding land. Mr. Steward stated that the major focus 272

on getting land is being able to acquire land that will benefit the community as a whole. He hasworked with the Town Assessor to find land that may be available.

275

MOTION: (Abare/Bergeron) To appoint Mr. Steward to a 3-year term on the Conservation
 Commission, ending in 2027.

282 Karen McKay – Conservation Commission (3-year term)

Chairman Croteau stated that Ms. McKay (31 Blueberry Circle) has been on the Board as long as
Mr. Gagnon has but is unable to make it tonight. He stated that if the Board is okay with it he is
comfortable appointing her.

294 Matthew Welch – Zoning Board of Adjustment (3-year term)

296 Mr. Welch (33 Brookview Drive) stated he is seeking reappointment for a 3-year term on the ZBA. Chairman Croteau asked Mr. Welch what experience he would bring to the position. Mr. 297 Welch stated he has been on the ZBA for just over a year and would like to continue. He 298 299 attended a zoning conference in Concord in October and will be attending one in April as well. Chairman Croteau asked Mr. Welch why he was seeking this appointment. Mr. Welch stated that 300 he received a crash course in Pelham's zoning laws in 2022 and noticed that there was a 301 recurring theme of the ZBA looking for members. He wanted to help out the community. 302 Chairman Croteau asked Mr. Welch what challenges he sees the ZBA face. Mr. Welch stated 303 that the pond lots are always challenging, as many undersized lots require variances to do 304 anything. 305 306 307 Ms. Abare thanked Mr. Welch for all of his hard work on the ZBA.

309 MOTION: (Abare/Corbett) To appoint Mr. Welch to a 3-year term on the Zoning Board of
310 Adjustment, ending in 2027.

Sean Hamilton – Zoning Board of Adjustment (3-year term)

316

Mr. Hamilton (36 Blueberry Circle) stated that he is seeking reappointment for a 3-year term on
the ZBA. He stated he has been an alternate member for about a year now and enjoys it. He has
been a Pelham resident since 2005 and has enjoyed raising his family here and seeing the Town
grow. He worked as a call firefighter for Pelham for about 14 years before he recently stepped
down. He now has more time to focus on the ZBA.

322

323 Chairman Croteau asked Mr. Hamilton what the biggest challenge the ZBA sees. Mr. Hamilton324 stated that he agrees with what Mr. Welch said and that keeping everyone happy is a challenge.

325 Chairman Croteau asked Mr. Hamilton what other challenges there were besides the pond lots.

326 Mr. Hamilton stated that the Town is seeing a lot of property being sold, developers coming in

- and people wanting to build housing communities.
- 328

MOTION: (Abare/Corbett) To appoint Mr. Hamilton to a 3-year term on the Zoning Board of
 Adjustment, ending in 2027.

Ms. Takesian noted that there was a third candidate for the ZBA, but they withdrew theirapplication.

Joanne Soucy – Trustees of the Trust Fund (1-year term, alternate)

- 340341 Ms. Soucy (8 Pineridge Road) stated that she is applying for a 1-year alternate position on the
- 342 Trustees of the Trust Fund. She stated that she attended all of their meetings last year and the 343 meeting they had in February and was able to get an overview of what their investment
- philosophy is. She has read through the handbook and RSAs, and their investment philosophy.
- 345 Ms. Soucy explained that she recently retired and is looking to volunteer some of her time to the
- Town. She believes her skill set best fits this Board.
- 347
- Ms. Abare thanked Ms. Soucy for volunteering and asked her to share more about her
 background and why this feels like the right fit for her. Ms. Soucy stated that most of her career
 has been in the administrative field, and she has focused on accounts payable, accounts
- receivable, payroll, documentation, production coordinating, and more. She is detail-oriented and
- well-organized. She stated that if she can be an alternate member this year it will help her learn
- more to see if she can become a full-time member in the future. Ms. Abare asked Ms. Soucy
 what her goals are for the Trustees of the Trust Fund. Ms. Soucy explained that she hopes to
- learn more about the thousands of trust funds they manage and learn more about the MS9 and
- 356 MS10 forms they have to file every year.

- Ms. Takesian stated that the trust funds all have documentation of what they are to be used for,
 and asked Ms. Soucy if she knew if they had all of that documentation and where it is. Ms.
 Soucy explained that she would have to ask Mr. Gleason, but she heard this documentation was
 in disarray, but they were starting to organize things very well.

369 Matt Rice – Pelham Community Power Committee (1-year term)

370

Mr. Rice (50 Nashua Road) stated that he has been on the committee for the last year, follows
energy prices, and uses solar and geothermal energy in his home. He stated he has an interest in
the field. Chairman Croteau asked Mr. Rice why he was seeking this position. Mr. Rice stated
that he is looking to fulfill his civic duty and help the Town. Chairman Croteau asked if Mr. Rice
was able to attend all of the meetings so far, and Mr. Rice stated he had.

- Ms. Abare thanked Mr. Rice for applying and stated that one complaint she hears over and overis about energy costs. She thanked Mr. Rice for helping to bring this opportunity to Pelham.
- 379380 Chairman Croteau asked Mr. Rice why he opted for a 1-year term instead of the 3-year term. Mr.
 - Rice stated that he started with a 1-year term, so he figured he would do a 1-year term again.

John Pickard – Forestry Committee 393

394 Mr. Pickard (57 South Shore Drive) stated that he is a lifelong Pelham resident and has extensive 395 knowledge of trail maintenance and clearing. He has been doing this most of his life, and in the 396 past couple of years started working with the Forestry Committee and Conservation 397 Commission. He would like to help manage these areas so all residents can enjoy them for legal 398 use. He also would like to make sure emergency services have access to these areas. Mr. Pickard 399 stated that he believes the Forestry Commission lost its way over time when it started going after 400 401 public property access rights, and he wants to help resolve these issues.

402

403 Chairman Croteau asked Mr. Pickard what he thinks the Forestry Committee is supposed to do. Mr. Pickard stated he believes they are supposed to manage the forests, trees, and wildlife. He 404

- 405 stated this is not his expertise, but he also thinks they are supposed to manage how it is used for 406 recreation.
- 407

408 Chairman Croteau noted that a warrant article recently passed that allows the Town to create a Trails Committee. He asked Mr. Pickard how this could come into play with the Forestry 409 Committee. Mr. Pickard stated he would also like to be a member of the Trails Committee, and 410 he thinks this will help organize groups to evaluate the trail systems, especially those that may 411

- not be used often and are overgrown. 412

Michelle Cooke – Forestry Committee 415

416

Ms. Cooke (14 Hinds Lane) stated that she is seeking this appointment because she is currently 417 418 on the Agricultural Commission and feels they have been working well together and would like to bring this to the Forestry Committee as well. She was just voted in as secretary by the 419 Agricultural Commission. She explained that she is continuously trying to learn more about the 420 421 Town and will do the same for forestry. Ms. Cooke stated that as a steward of the forests, she

believes they have to take care of it, and she is committed to doing this. 422

423

Chairman Croteau asked Ms. Cooke what she thinks the Forestry Committee is supposed to do. 424 425 Ms. Cooke stated that she believes they should be stewards of the forest and take care of it. She

- stated they need to maintain it. Ms. Cooke stated trucks and ATVs should not be on the trails. 426
- 427
- 428 Chairman Croteau asked Ms. Cooke what she thought about the recent warrant article that
- 429 passed. Ms. Cooke stated that it needs to be managed properly and it can work.
- 430

431 Chairman Croteau asked Ms. Cooke why she thinks they have 9 applicants for the Forestry

432 Committee when many other committees do not have nearly as many applicants. Ms. Cooke

- stated that she is applying to this committee because all the other applicants are also on the
- 434 OHRV Committee, and her focus is on the trees and the animals. She noted that she has been
- teaching kids for over 29 years, and recently won an award for helping get students unpluggedand outside.
- 437
- 438 Chairman Croteau thanked Ms. Cooke for all her efforts in Town.
- 439 440

441 Mark Duquette – Forestry Committee

442
443 Mr. Duquette (30 Old Bridge Street) stated that he is applying to the Forestry Committee because
444 has close to 40 years of experience as an environmental engineer. He has experience in wetlands
445 protection, wetlands mediation, managing and restoring agricultural resources, managing wildlife

- resources, invasive species management, erosion and sediment control, stormwater management,threatened and endangered species management, and more. He stated that all of these things
- threatened and endangered species management, and more. He stated that all of these thingsoverlay into what forestry does. Mr. Duquette noted that he has a bachelor's degree in
- environmental science and has multiple environmental science certifications. He also has an
- 450 MBA in organizational and environmental sustainability. Mr. Duquette explained that he was on
- 451 the Conservation Commission for a few years in the mid-2000s. He was also on Hudson's
- 452 Conservation Commission. He is also a trail adopter in Town and is responsible for monitoring
- 453 two trails. He has hiked all the trails in Town. He has read and is familiar with all of the forest
- 454 management plans in Town. Mr. Duquette stated that he is 100% in alignment with the Forestry
- 455 Committee's mission to plan, preserve, and protect forested Town-owned lands.
- 456

457 Chairman Croteau asked Mr. Duquette what his thoughts were on the warrant article that
458 recently passed for the Trails Committee. Mr. Duquette stated that he thinks it is a bit redundant
459 in the fact that there are already trial adopters and volunteers who do an amazing job, but the
460 Town voted it in so they have to make it work.

461

Ms. Corbett noted that there are only 2 open positions on the Forestry Committee, and stated
that, with Mr. Duquette's background, he should consider applying for the open alternate
position of the Conservation Commission as well. Mr. Duquette stated that he is not interested in

- that at this time.
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- 467

468 Bob Lamoureux – Forestry Committee

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470 Mr. Lamoureux (28 Blueberry Circle) stated that he is seeking a 3-year term on the Forestry Committee. He brought up a comment Ms. Corbett made at a previous Forestry Committee 471 meeting about putting personal or political differences aside to work together and move forward 472 473 as a community. He thanked Ms. Corbett for this comment and noted that he also thinks this is very important. Mr. Lamoureaux stated that he has been involved in land deals, trails, and more 474 475 in Town for many years. He stated the master plan explains exactly what they need to do to conserve and maintain the land. He said he wants to bring forestry into the next generation of 476 477 Pelham taxpayers since it is evolving and changing. Mr. Lamoureaux stated that the way he

478 understands it, the Trail Committee was put into effect since the Conservation Commission has

the authority to create sub-committees and the Forestry Committee does not and they needed to

- 480 put it to a vote. Mr. Lamoureaux said his specific goal or objective is to see the Forestry
- 481 Committee go back to timber harvesting and pay attention to anything that involves forestry. He
- 482 said he does not feel the Forestry Committee should be able to make all the rules and regulations483 for the trails and forests. He sees the Trails Committee as more of a working committee, and the
- 484 Forestry Committee can focus on timber harvesting and bringing in income to help the Trails
- 484 Forestry Committee can focus on timber harvesting and oringing in income to help the frails 485 Committee with the trails. He said the forest is a big evolving thing and we need to evolve with
- 486

it.

- 487488 Chairman Croteau asked Mr. Lam
- Chairman Croteau asked Mr. Lamoureaux what he thinks a Forestry Committee member's job is.
 Mr. Lamoureaux stated that they are involved with every aspect of maintaining the forest, like
 the master plan, the purchasing of the properties, the timber harvest, and more.
- 491

Ms. Abare thanked Mr. Lamoureaux for applying and stated that the Town's taxpayers have paid 492 for hundreds of acres of land and asked Mr. Lamoureaux how many miles of trails are in Pelham 493 that the Forestry Committee is responsible for. Mr. Lamoureaux stated that there are over 100 494 miles of trails in Pelham. He said that they are still trying to figure out the exact number of miles, 495 but there are many different maps with different kinds of trails. Ms. Abare asked Mr. 496 Lamoureaux when the last time all of these trails were maintained and asked him to define 497 maintain. Mr. Lamoureaux stated that he thinks they are lacking in maintaining the trails. Ms. 498 499 Abare stated she envisions the Forestry Committee being a working board to bring back the taxpayer's assets in Town. She asked Mr. Lamoureaux what his plan was for maintaining the 500 501 trails. Mr. Lamoureaux stated that the plan is the Trails Committee that the taxpayers voted to 502 put into place, and he believes once they get established, they will get a lot done and catch up quickly. Ms. Abare is hoping that this is not just an advisory board but a goal-oriented team that 503 504 will work together to fix the trails.

505

Ms. Corbett stated that Ms. Irish-Simpson keeps a detailed log of all the labor hours spent by the 506 Town's trail adopters and all those who spend time working on the trails. She explained that 507 many members of the Forestry Committee dedicate hours, days, and weeks of their time to 508 509 maintaining the trails. Ms. Corbett asked Mr. Lamoureaux what his involvement has been in working on the trails with the trail adopters. Mr. Lamoureaux stated that he is out there 510 frequently working on the trails. He stated he also organizes a lot of people who have bushhogs 511 to volunteer their time to help with bushhogging in different areas in Town. Ms. Corbett asked if 512 it was accurate to infer that the Forestry Committee is not a working board. Mr. Lamoureaux 513 514 stated it is not accurate, and they are a working board.

515

516 Ms. Takesian asked Mr. Lamoureaux about his going into Peabody Forest to clear it out for emergency vehicle access. She asked if this was similar to the issue they are having on Spaulding 517 Hill and if opening these trails for emergency vehicle access allows space for any vehicle to go 518 on the trails. Mr. Lamoureaux stated that there are gates around the properties and the quad issue 519 is the abutters using quads on the trails. He stated every time they put a gate up they break the 520 521 stone wall down and get in, and this will continue to happen. Ms. Takesian asked Mr. Lamoureaux how the Forestry Committee would work with the Community Trails Committee 522 523 which has over 200 members. Mr. Lamoureaux stated that they should work with the new Trails Committee since the taxpayers voted them in. He stated there has to be a chain of command, so 524 525 people are not just trying to contact a bunch of different people.

- 527 Chairman Croteau thanked Mr. Lamoureaux.

530 Linda Irish-Simpson – Forestry Committee

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Ms. Irish-Simpson (52 Sagewood Drive) stated that she is currently on the Forestry Committee 532 533 and has been on the sub-committee for a few years as well. She is a trail adopter for 2 different areas and runs the trail adopter program and the Town's hike challenge. She also works on 534 articles for the Evergreen every month about trails and forests in Town. She stated she would 535 536 like to continue the work of forestry to make sure the trails are well maintained, safe, and promoted for all to enjoy. Ms. Irish-Simpson stated she would like to expand the trial adopter 537 538 program, as they currently have 29. She would like to continue and expand the hiking challenge and is considering starting a winter hike challenge. She would also like to continue to promote 539 the trails by writing articles for the Evergreen. 540

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542 Chairman Croteau asked Ms. Irish-Simpson what she believes the intent of the Forestry

- 543 Committee is. Ms. Irish-Simpson stated that their mission statement is to protect the woods,544 water, wildlife, and passive recreation.
- 545

Chairman Croteau asked Ms. Irish-Simpson to explain her day-to-day job working as a volunteer
on the Forestry Committee. She explained that she spends a lot of time out on the trails with trail
adopters working to fix any issues on the trails. She stated that the hike challenge has now had
50 people complete it, which keeps her busy as well.

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Chairman Croteau stated that they had an issue in the Gumpas area a few weeks ago, and asked
Ms. Irish-Simpson what they could have done better as a group to fix the alleged breach in the
dams. She stated that they should have approached a biologist or someone at the University of

554 New Hampshire about the issue first, but the beavers are back to building in this area now.

555

Ms. Corbett asked Ms. Irish-Simpson if wetlands violations get reported in the same manner as
other issues on trails, like fallen trees. Ms. Irish-Simpson stated that she only knows of one
wetlands violation that was reported, and Mr. Gagnon is handling it. Ms. Corbett asked if there
was a process in place for reporting this and collecting the data. Ms. Irish-Simpson stated there
was a process in place and a place for this data.

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Ms. Abare thanked Ms. Irish-Simpson for applying and asked her if trail adopters do any trail maintenance or if they just report the issues and if they do not perform the maintenance who does. Ms. Irish-Simpson stated the trail adopters manage 22 miles of trails, and there are 3-4 trail adopters per conservation area. They have to go out 3-4 times per year to manage the trails, but some adopters are there a lot more frequently. When they walk the trails, they cut back the vegetation, move branches, and clear the trails. If tree or branch removal requires a chainsaw that is when the chair is contacted, as the adopters are not expected to use chainsaws.

569

570 Ms. Abare stated that the voters put her in this seat, and the taxpayers are the ones who paid for 571 all of this land, and she does not feel like the land is being maintained properly. Ms. Abare stated 572 that 22 miles out of 100 is only 22%, which means 22% of the trails are being maintained lightly.

573 She said the appointments of this Board need to be all-hands-on-deck to maintaining all 100

574 miles of trails, and asked how they are going to restore the trails before they lose them. Chairman

575 Croteau noted that Ms. Abare may have this perspective, but the entire Board of Selectmen may

not feel this way and asked Ms. Abare to remain cautious before stating that the trails are not
being maintained without proof. Ms. Abare stated that she is happy to supply photos of the trails

577 being maintained without proof. Ms. Abare stated that she is happy to supply photos of the trails 578 and is trying to get an answer on how they go forward with taking care of taxpayers' assets. Ms.

- 579 Irish-Simpson asked Ms. Abare where the 100 miles of trails she is talking about are, because
- some may be snowmobiling trails or on private property. Ms. Abare stated that the master plan
- reflects that they want to buy 1,000 more acres of land but they do not have a plan today to take
- care of what they have already. Ms. Abare wants to appoint someone serious about protecting the
- taxpayer's property. Ms. Irish-Simpson asked Ms. Abare to provide her with the specific trailsand locations that she feels are not maintained so they can take care of it.
- 585

Ms. Corbett noted that Mr. Lamoreaux stated that there were approximately 100 miles of trails,
and the 22 miles of trails that Ms. Irish-Simpson speaks of are on the map and managed by the
Forestry Committee. Ms. Irish-Simpson agreed.

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591 Dale Gallaher – Forestry Committee

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593 Mr. Gallaher (265 Windham Road) stated that he has worked on the trails since 2012 and has marked most of the 22 miles with trail markers. He and his wife have done a lot of work to create 594 595 trails, install benches, and maintain them. He has been on many committees in Town and was a scoutmaster for 7 years. Mr. Gallaher stated that there are many different issues and opinions on 596 597 the Forestry Committee, and he feels like he can work with everyone. He also has gone on-site walks with the Town Forester during the harvesting, so he has a good understanding of how it 598 works. Mr. Gallaher stated he is seeking this appointment because forestry is a passion for him 599 and enjoys maintaining the trails. He and his wife are trail adopters for 2 different areas. He 600 stated he has cut down over 6 fallen trees on trails in the past year. His goal for the Forestry 601 Committee is to continue working with other committees to maintain the trails and make them 602 available for all permitted uses. Mr. Gallaher stated that the Forestry Committee has had a sub-603 committee for 3 years now, and he thinks it is good that the Town decided to make it official and 604 605 now they can focus more on trail maintenance. He thinks the Forestry Committee should remain 606 the governing body of the sub-committee.

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Ms. Corbett thanked Mr. Gallaher for all of his volunteer hours. Chairman Croteau thanked Mr.Gallaher.

610 611

612 James Fisher – Forestry Committee

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Mr. Fisher (47 Seavey Road) stated that he manages his wood lot of approximately 65 acres in 614 Pelham. He can identify all native trees just by looking at the bark, canopy, and leaves. He would 615 like to see the Forestry Committee start to log, not only to make money but to increase the 616 617 productivity of the forest. He thinks some areas are over-logged, which needs to be managed better. Mr. Fisher thinks they should time the logging based on the timber pricing. He has a 618 passion for the forest and wants to work at re-establishing the chestnut trees. His goal for the 619 Forestry Committee is to control the invasive species in Town. He would also like to see all the 620 621 members of the committee get along and work together. Mr. Fisher stated he also has his

622 equipment and is willing to help clear areas.

623

624 Ms. Corbett stated that she liked his idea about timing the logging based on timber pricing. She 625 asked if the forestry management plan is broken up by area, and an audience member confirmed this. Ms. Corbett asked if Mr. Fisher thinks it would be possible to target the logging based on 626 speciation instead of general areas. Mr. Fisher stated that it is based on past logging, and they 627 need to pick the trees that are best to harvest. 628

629

630 Chairman Croteau asked Mr. Fisher how he thinks they can all work together, including the Trails Committee. Mr. Fisher stated he thinks it is great everyone is working together, and this 631

- 632 can help get more done.
- 633

634 Ms. Takesian stated that they need to manage their forest and trails better, and the Forestry Committee needs a plan to manage all of the people who want to help maintain the trails. She 635 stated there are over 200 members of the Community Trail Coalition, and they need to be 636 managed properly. Ms. Takesian asked Mr. Fisher if he thought he could create a plan to help 637 manage everyone. Mr. Fisher stated he would like to see the trails accessible to everyone, and 638

right now they are not. He stated that if they all work together it will get figured out. 639

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642 Nick Spanos – Forestry Committee

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Mr. Spanos (9 Claudine Drive) stated that he has been attending the meetings for about 5 years, 644 645 and he is happy so many people are getting involved now. Mr. Spanos said he has cleaned trails and other areas in Town and has helped repair a bridge in Town. He stated that they need to 646 make sure the trails are maintained and safe for everyone. Mr. Spanos stated that he is hands-on 647 and self-employed and can dedicate time to helping wherever he is needed. He has learned a lot 648 about forestry in the past 5 years. Mr. Spanos stated he wants to keep giving back to the Town. 649 He said the Forestry Committee could lean on him and he will help them in any way he can, and 650 he is willing to learn. 651

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Chairman Croteau asked Mr. Spanos what he thinks is the ultimate goal of the Forestry 653

Committee. Mr. Spanos stated that their job is to maintain and protect the forests, water, and 654 wildlife for future generations. 655

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Ms. Abare asked Mr. Spanos how many hours he had spent in the Pelham forests removing trees 657 658 and performing trail maintenance. He stated that he does not have an exact tally, but he volunteers whenever he can. Ms. Abare asked how often he picks up trees. Mr. Spanos stated he 659 660 has been involved for 5 years now and feels like he does more every year. He said it changes

- 661 every year.
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Chairman Croteau thanked Mr. Spanos 663

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Debbie Kruzel – Forestry Committee 666

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Ms. Kruzel (76 Beacon Hill Road) stated that she has been an outdoor enthusiast for over 50 668 years. She adopted 2 trails a year and a half ago, and hikes 10-15 miles every week. She stated 669 she calls a lot of the issues she sees, and the issues are usually resolved within 2 days. Ms. 670

671 Kruzel said she was on the Library Trustees Board, was in the Greater Salem Rotary Club, and

672 more. She is seeking this appointment because she spends a lot of time in the forests and enjoys

it. She believes the purpose of the Forestry Committee is to protect the forests for the citizens ofPelham and for the citizens to have access to the land. Ms. Kruzel said she can work with lots of

people and can cooperate with them. She thinks it is important to get more children outside and
 on the trails.

- 678 Chairman Croteau thanked Ms. Kruzel and stated that her idea to get kids outside and on the
- 679 trails was the best idea he heard all night.
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681 682 <u>DISCUSSION</u>

Ms. Abare stated that she was updating her signature block in her email, and she noticed not
everyone has the same signature block. She asked Town Administrator Roark if they could make
all of their signature blocks uniform. She thought Mr. Demers had a good signature block.

- 688 Chairman Croteau stated that Ms. Abare and Town Administrator Roark can work on a689 suggested signature block and present it to the Board, and they can form a consensus.

- Ms. Takesian stated that she likes how the Parks and Recreation Department updates its logo for
 different seasons and holidays. She said that she does not think they should all have the same
 signature and is not ready for that.
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Ms. Abare stated that was fine and they did not need to all have the same signature, and shewould pick one and update hers.
